He works with educators, retailers, manufacturers, technicians, and performers to bring the work of the National Coalition for Music Education to the attention of decision-makers on the national, state, and local levels. An accomplished musician, he played professionally in several bands and led his own orchestra for many years. He served as president of the Piano Manufacturers Association International and the National Piano Foundation. He also served as president of the American Music Conference, a national non-profit educational association founded in 1947 to encourage active amateur music-making and music education for people of all ages. He is an Honorary Life Member of the Tri-M Music Honor Society and a Life Member of the Musicians Union.





1992 ELIZABETH MATHIAS AWARD Vivian Menees Nelson





Leone Buyse, Flutist 1992 Convention Artist



The 1970 Sterling Staff International Competition winner, Leone Buyse, Mu Upsilon/ Rochester Alumni, is the 1992 International Convention featured artist. She will perform with the Utah Symphony in Symphony Hall, Friday, August 14. She is also scheduled to speak at the Friday Luncheon and to perform Shirley Moore's Ori-Occi at the Saturday Luncheon with the composer at the piano. Acting principal flutist of the Boston Symphony and principal of the Boston Pops, she previously served as assistant principal of the San Francisco Symphony and played piccolo and flute with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra. She was the only American finalist in the 1969 Geneva International Flute Competition. She has appeared as soloist with l'Orchestre de la Suisse Romande, the Boston Pops, the San Francisco Symphony, the Rochester Philharmonic, and the New Hampshire Music Festival.

A native of Ithaca, New York, Leone received a bachelor's degree and Performer's Certificate in 1968 from the Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester, where she studied

with Joseph Mariano. Awarded a Fulbright grant, she spent two years in Europe studying with Michel Debost, Jean-Pierre Rampal, and Marcel. She is also an accomplished pianist, serving for two summers as accompanist for Rampal's master classes in Nice, France. She holds a master's degree and Distinguished Alumna Award from Emporia State University, Kansas, where her research on Joseph Bodin de Boismortier was published.

Greatly in demand as an adjudicator, speaker, and clinician, she was a judge for the 1980 Mu Phi Epsilon Competition in Indianapolis and recently judged the General Motors-Seventeen Magazine Competition at Oberlin College.

Leone has served on the Board of Directors of the National Flute Association and was program chair for the 1987 NFA Convention in St. Louis, an event attended by over 2,200 flutists. She has appeared as soloist on the popular PBS television series, "Evening at Pops," and on many recordings of the Boston Symphony, Boston Pops, and San Francisco Symphony for Philips, Deutsche Grammophon, RCA Victor, and Sony Classical labels. She has completed her first solo CD, devoted to contemporary American chamber music.

THE UTAH SYMPHONY, Joseph Silverstein, Music Director, was founded in April 1940 and presented its first concert in May 1940. Members of a WPA Orchestra formed the nucleus of the new organization, with members of the Salt Lake Federated Musicians adding their talents to increase the orchestra to 60 pieces. The commitment of many individuals and arts organizations assured that Utah would have a permanent symphony orchestra, although the state had not fully recovered from the Great Depression and World War II was soon to involve the United States. Under the direction of Maestro Maurice Abravanel from 1947 to 1979. the Utah Symphony became one of the premier orchestras in the U.S., with many rave-review recordings and tour performances. It has featured outstanding guest soloists from around the world and welcomes Mu Phi Epsilon artist Leone Buyse. Robert Henderson, the Utah Symphony's newly appointed Associate Conductor, will be on the podium for this concert. Symphony Hall, completed a dozen years ago, has been widely acclaimed for its stunning architecture and acoustical properties.


Final Judges Chosen for Mu Phi Epsilon International Competition

Her concert appearances throughout the country provided many opportunities, ultimately including an audition with Jascha Heifetz where she became a member of the Heifetz Master Class and later his assistant. At the time of his death, Sherry learned that his Carlo Tononi violin and Tourte bow had been willed to her. As he assured in that way that the Heifetz legacy will continue to live through Sherry during her lifetime, Sherry dedicates every lesson taught and every performance to that legacy, assuring its continuity.

Tenor **David Britton** is noted for a wide range of operatic roles and has performed frequently at festivals, including Aspen, Caramoor, and Spoleto. Orchestral engagements have included performances with the New York Philharmonic, the Chicago and Boston Symphony Orchestras, the National Symphony, and Philadelphia Orchestra. He studied music at North Texas State University, apprenticed in Santa Fe, and while still in school sang with the Dallas Civic Opera. In 1972 he moved to New York to pursue his career and in January 1973 he made his New York debut with *Musica Sacra* and also made his New York operatic debut.



The Tortoise in the Desert?

It's not an endangered species. In fact, it's very well preserved. The Tortoise in the Desert is a fanciful name given to the Mormon Tabernacle by an early visitor to the city. Brigham Young had a hand in the design, but architect William H. Folsom drew the plans and supervised construction (1864-67) along with William Grow, a bridge builder from Pennsylvania who used the lattice-truss method of constructing suspension bridges to create the arched roof. The 250 x 150- foot building, which seats about 8,000, is used for conferences of the LDS Church, the Tabernacle Choir broadcast every Sunday, daily organ recitals, community concerts and even the funerals of prominent citizens. Many famous musicians have performed here, and before the construction of Symphony Hall it was home to the Utah Symphony. The Famous Tabernacle Organ patterned after the Methuen Memorial Music Hall organ (formerly in Boston Music Hall), the Tabernacle organ was built by Joseph Ridges and Niels Johnson beginning in 1866. Over the years it has been enlarged and rebuilt. The unique Aeolian-Skinner organ of 1948 is considered the masterpiece of G. Donald Harrison. This instrument was renovated during 1984-88 under the direction of Jack M. Bethards, President and Tonal Director of Schoenstein & Co.

Notes on Participants

The University of Utah Brass Quintet, formed in 1988 by members of the U. of Utah Wind Symphony and the Marching Band, performs extensively, appearing at the arts festivals in Park City and Salt Lake. Members are Scott Call and Scott Devey, trumpet; Jeff Orr, french horn; Matt Boehme, trombone; and Chad Davis, tuba.

John Harbison, an accomplished violist, tubist, and jazz pianist, studied at Harvard, the Hochschule fur Musik, and Princeton (MFA 1963). Professionally, he has had notable success as a teacher at Harvard and MIT, Co-Musical Director of the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and composer in residence with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. He has been the featured composer of the New York Philomusica Chamber Ensemble since the 1990-91 season. As a composer, has received the Kennedy Center Friedheim Award (1979), the Pulitzer Prize (1987), and a MacArthur Fellowship (1989). Due libri dei Mottetti di Montale was commissioned in part by Mu Phi Epsilon in honor of the late Dr. Merle Montgomery and had its premiere in April 1992 in New York City.

Brian Clarence Hulse, a senior studying composition at the University of Utah, was recently honored as the 1992 Presser Scholar. His principal teachers have included Steve Roens, Bruce Reich, and Morris Rosenzweig. Mr. Hulse has served as assistant director of the A Cappella Choir and Concert Chorale at the U. and is currently assistant conductor of the U. New Music Ensemble as well as founder and director of the Utah Composers' Ensemble.

Chamber Ensemble members include Elaine Jorgensen, Salt Lake City Alumni, flute; Debbie Rees, oboe; Jaren Hinckley, Epsilon Mu, clarient/bass clarinet; Matthew Croft, french horn; Shannon Hanks, violin; Jeff Parry, viola; Steve Hodson, Epsilon Mu, cello; Lola Howard, bass; Marie Madsen, Epsilon Mu, celeste.

Wynona Lipsett, 1992 Competition Coordinator for the Memorial Foundation Board, has served as Dallas Alumni President, South Central Province Governor, and Public Relations Officer, Fifth and Second Vice President on the International Executive Board. Currently a high school choral director, Wynona also has a successful career as a performer. She recently completed two years as state pianist for Delta Kappa Gamma and had two songs published in their 1990 Songbook V. She performs with the Dallas Symphony Chorus and Mesquite Civic Chorus and is in demand as an accompanist.

Musical Accent, founded in 1990 to perform in conjunction with the Gina Bachauer Festival, has since at numerous functions, including a recent performance at the U. of Utah Medical School Convocation. Performing at the reception are Steve Alder, flute; Vince Humphries, piano; Lars Yorgason, bass; Don Marsh, drums.

The String Quartet has played extensively along the Wasatch Front since 1987. Coached by Mikhail Bogaslovski, violist in the Utah Symphony, the group was chosen by audition as the U. of Utah Honors String Quartet. Members are Jeff Parry, first violin; Anne Wilson, second violin; Nola Campbell, viola; and Larissa Humphries, cellothe latter three Epsilon Mu/Salt Lake City Alumni.

Judith Balo Goff has won numerous honors and awards, including the 1974 Mu Phi Epsilon International Competition. She has a substantial background in regional opera productions, has presented concerts and recitals across the United States and Europe, and is an active teacher and chamber musician.

Shirley Moore, Atlanta Alumni, studied at Shorter College, Stephens College, George State University, and the Heidelberg-Mannheim Hochschule fur Musik. She studied composition with Charles Knox and Hans Vogt and piano with Tom Brumby and Cary Lewis. She teaches piano privately and has been an Artist Affiliate at Emory University for 15 years. Recipient of the NFMC First Prize for composition, she has had her works performed in the U.S. and other countries. *Ori-Occi*, three movements for flute and piano capturing impressions from travels to Eastern Europe in 1987-88, won the 1991 Mu Phi Epsilon Original Composition Contest, Division II, Class A (graduate students/alumni, large works, no time limit).

Dr. Jo Ann Domb, Professor of Music and Chair of the U. of Indianapolis Music Department since 1983, is very active as performer (Mezzo-Soprano soloist), educator, and administrator, giving workshops for teachers on music in world cultures and visiting more than 20 college and university music departments nationwide as accreditation evaluator for the National Association of Schools of Music. She has served Mu Phi Epsilon since 1983 as Faculty Adviser to Beta Psi Chapter, as Director of East Central 2 District, and as International 4th Vice President, Music Adviser, since 1989. She holds degrees from Oberlin College (B.M.) and the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music (M.M. and D.M.E.), with additional advanced study at Boston University.

Dr. Hansonia Caldwell is Dean of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts at California State University-Dominguez Hills. A nationally known musicologist and pianist specializing in the study of Afro-American music, she is accompanist for conductor/composer Dr. Jester Hairston. She studied at Boston University (B.M.) and the University of Southern California (M.A. and Ph.D.). A frequent lecturer, Hansonia spoke at the Second International Congress on Women in Music. She is active in the International Council of Fine Arts, Western Association of Graduate Schools, Robert Shaw Summer Choral Music Workshop, and Los Angeles Choral Conductors Guild. She was vice president of Beverly Hills Alumni and is International 5th Vice President, Eligibility Adviser.

ASSEMBLY HALL

Completed in 1882, the Assembly Hall is one of the historic buildings included in Temple Square's designation by the National Park Service as a National Historic Landmark. It was designed by early Utah architect William Folsom in a modified Gothic style. Elements of Gothic architecture are found on many buildings in Salt Lake City, that being one of the popular styles in nineteenth-century America. Seen against a background of late-twentieth-century architecture embodied in nearby office/business buildings and the stunning Symphony Hall, the Assembly Hall with its many pinnacles, stained glass, and beautiful wood continues to charm Utah residents and visitors from all over the world. The Assembly Hall plays an important role in Utah's rich tradition of music. It now hosts the Temple Square Concert Series, inaugurated in June 1980 as part of the LDS Church's sesquicentennial celebration. The series brings outstanding musical performances to the whole community at no charge. Concerts by local Mu Phi Epsilon members are part of this proud tradition. In the early 1980s the Assembly Hall underwent extensive renovation/restoration. At that time the beautiful organ was installed by organ designer and builder Robert Sipe and his wife Susan. Each pipe was individually voiced and "sings"—a quality that LDS Church musicians especially wanted.

Music Delegates' Recital Performers



W. Edwin Domb serves as Minister of Music at Roberts Park United Methodist Church in Indianapolis, Indiana, and teaches organ and music history at the University of Indianapolis. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Organ Performance at Oberlin College, his Master's Degree at the Eastman School of Music, and his DMA degree at the University of Cincinnati. A former dean of the Cincinnati chapter of the American Guild of Organists, he is currently sub-dean of the Indianapolis chapter. He has performed organ recitals throughout Europe and the United States.



Kimberly Crosby, who began piano lessons at age four, has studied with Lenora Neal Brown and currently studies with Gladys Gladstone at the University of Utah. She was the 1986 Sterling Scholar in Music for the state of Utah and has performed with the Utah Symphony, the Salt Lake Symphony, and the University of Utah Symphony Orchestra. She spent 1988 in Switzerland studying piano and composition at the Musik-Akademie der Stadt Basel. Kimberly is active as an accompanist and chamber musician with a special interest in twentieth-century music. She attended the 1989 International Mu Phi Epsilon Convention in Chicago as a business delegate.



Charlotte Dick recently graduated with honors from Lewis and Clark College in Portland, Oregon. In August 1989 she participated in the Moscow Music Peace Festival, in summer 1990 in the Miami School of Music at Salzburg program, and in summer 1991 in the Richard Miller Vocal Institute. She was president of Delta Epsilon at Lewis and Clark, 1990-92, and held numerous other positions of leadership. She currently is enrolled in the vocal studies program at the Aspen Music Festival and this fall will begin work on a Master's degree at Indiana University, Bloomington, in preparation for a career in opera.



Norene Emerson began her piano training in Ogden, Utah, and graduated from the University of Utah with Phi Beta Kappa honors. She was named Utah Artist and toured Utah and Idaho under the auspices of the Utah Concerts Council. She is credited with giving the first complete performance in Utah of the Rachmaninoff Third Piano Concerto. Her teachers have included Reid Nibley, Helen Folland, and Oscar Wagner. A charter member of Epsilon Mu chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon, Norene is also a member of Music Circle, Piano Club, and the Utah Music Teachers Association. She and Susan Goodfellow have formed a piano-flute duo and performed across the state and on the East Coast. Norene is the official 1992 Convention accompanist.



Jaren Hinckley, a music performance major at the University of Utah, studies with Christie Lundquist. In 1987 he was the National First Place Winner in the MTNA High School Woodwind Auditions and performed as soloist with the Manhattan School of Music Philharmonia following the competition in New York City. That same year he performed with the Utah Symphony in the annual Salute to Youth Concert. In 1991 he won first place in the Senior Winds Division of the Utah State Fair competition and again performed as soloist on the Salute to Youth Concert with the Utah Symphony. Jaren teaches ten private clarinet students, performs with numerous University of Utah music organizations, and does occasional freelance work. He is the current president of Epsilon Mu collegiate chapter of Mu Phi Epsilon at the University of Utah.



Jed Moss, well known in Utah as a performer and accompanist, has studied with Georgia Blastock, Margaret Ott, and Gladys Gladstone. He has performed as soloist with the Beethoven Series Chamber Orchestra, Idaho State Civic Symphony, Magic Valley Symphony, University of Utah Symphony Orchestra, BYU Chamber Orchestra, and the Utah Chamber Orchestra. In October 1991 Jed played Leonard Bernstein's Age of Anxiety at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., for Ballet West's premiere of John Neumier's ballet. He recently toured Vienna and Munich with Utah's Repertory Dance Theatre.



Deborah Aitken received her Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Southern California and her Master of Arts from California State University, Northridge. She has studied with Alberto Mozzati in Milan, Italy, and has been coached by others, including Andre Watts. She is active both as soloist and ensemble pianist, performing throughout the United States and in Europe and Central America. Later this year she will perform in Japan and Italy and tour Mexico and Central America under the auspices of the U.S. State Department. Currently she is a member of the faculty of El Camino College in Redondo Beach, California, and resides in Manhattan Beach.



Judy May Sellheim, mezzo-soprano, holds the position of artist/faculty at Arizona State University. A winner of the Mu Phi Epsilon International Competition, she has performed extensively in the U.S. and abroad. In addition to her appearance at Carnegie Hall with the Manhattan Philharmonic, she has been featured with the Phoenix Symphony, the Central Wisconsin Symphony, and the Aspen Chamber Symphony with Luciano Berio conducting. A versatile interpreter of modern music, Judy has several world premieres to her credit, including *Spiral II* by Chinery Ung in Sapporo, Japan. A native of Illinois, she holds degrees from the University of Illinois and the Juilliard School.

Eckart Sellheim is the director of the Accompanying Program at Arizona State University and Professor of Fortepiano at the Trossingen Hochschule für Musik. He is a much sought-after chamber musician with over 300 German radio recordings both as collaborative artist and solo pianist. In a duo with his brother, the cellist Friedrich-Jurgen Sellheim, he performs and records regularly in Germany.



Maquette Kuper, flutist, a 1974 winner of the Mu Phi Epsilon International Competition, is a founding member of the Capitol Chamber Players in Sacramento, California. A graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music, she spent two summers as a fellowship student at Tanglewood and studied in Paris as a Fulbright Fellow. Maquette has appeared as soloist with the Boston Pops and has performed in Europe and throughout the United States. She maintains a private studio in Davis, California.

The Mu Phi Epsilon Piano Quartet (Epsilon Mu Alumni Chapter) was organized in March 1991. They have performed on numerous occasions, including the Temple Square Concert Series in August 1991 and are scheduled for another concert in the series on September 11, 1992. The four artists are dedicated to exploring music written and/or arranged for two pianos/eight hands, a genre once popular but sadly neglected today. They are coached by Solveig Madsen.



Annette Kirk Horman began her piano studies at age six, and her teachers include Florence Brinton and Gladys Gladstone. She received a music scholarship to the University of Utah and earned a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance. She is currently on the faculty of the University of Utah Piano Pedagogy Division and also teaches privately.



Elizabeth Hurst Lund received a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance and Pedagogy from the University of Utah. In addition to her solo performing, she has done extensive accompanying for soloists and choral and musical theatre productions. She currently teaches privately and is an active member of the Music Teachers National Association (MTNA) and the Utah Federation of Music Clubs.



Gaye Ann Harris England performs and accompanies throughout Utah and the region. She has performed as guest soloist on the Steinway Artists Concert Series and has been a frequent performer on the Temple Square Concert Series. She received a teaching certificate from the Sherwood School of Music in Chicago and her Bachelor of Music in Piano Pedagogy and Master of Music in Piano Performance degrees from the University of Utah where she has taught theory in the Music Department. She has been active in the MTNA and the National Guild of Piano Teachers.



Lenora Ford Brown has performed extensively in the U.S. and throughout the Far East. She is currently an adjunct Associate Professor of Piano at the University of Utah and teaches privately. She has gained recognition throughout the nation with her piano workshop and educational video tapes: Reaching for Repertoire and Beginning Keyboard. She is music director for a group piano studio, Keyboard Academy, and a member of the MTNA, which has honored her with an Advanced Professional certificate.




Jerold Ottley

A native of Salt Lake City, Dr. Jerold Ottley has been Music Director and Conductor of the world famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir since April 1975. His career with the Choir was preceded by many years as a teacher and conductor in the schools and churches of the area. He is currently Adjunct Professor of Music at the University of Utah.

He holds degrees in music from Brigham Young University, the U. of Utah, and the U. of Oregon. In 1968, as Fulbright scholar, he studied conducting, voice, and choral performance practice at the Academy of Music in Cologne, Germany.

He has conducted many recordings for CBS Masterworks and has directed concerts throughout the USA and the world He has also conducted the Utah Symphony in recording and performance and the Columbia Symphony in recording.



Ardean Watts

Now in his 32nd year teaching in the University of Utah Music Department, Ardean Watts received the special rank of University Professor in 1984 and the Distinguished Teaching Award at the 1992 commencement. His teaching career is matched by an illustrious performing career as a pianist and conductor. A leader of big-band jazz in the

1950s, he joined the Utah Symphony as official pianist in 1957 and served as associate conductor, 1968-79.

The founding director of the U. of Utah Opera Company, he has also served as Musical Director for Ballet West and Pioneer Memorial Theatre. Known as an innovator, he played a key role in music technology at the U. and has been faculty advisor to Epsilon Mu since 1987. He received music degrees from Brigham Young University and the U. and also studied at the Academy of Music in Vienna.

GRANTS-IN-AID

A Grant-in-Aid of \$500 is awarded by the Foundation for a specific purpose essential and pertinent to the completion of some extraordinary, worthwhile music project or undertaking well beyond the planning stage.

LAVERNE JACKSON MUSIC THERAPY GRANT

The Laverne Jackson Music Therapy Grant of \$1,000 is given to a person who completes the degree work and is going to do the internship.

MABEL HENDERSON MEMORIAL GRANT FOR FOREIGN EXPERIENCE

The Mabel Henderson Memorial Grant is awarded for foreign musical experience on the basis of high attainment in the applicant's major field.

This Grant is \$1,500. It is offered annually and is awarded only upon recommendation of the Mabel Henderson Memorial Grant Committee.

MERLE MONTGOMERY DOCTORAL GRANT

The Merle Montgomery Doctoral Grant of \$1,000 is awarded on the basis of evidence that an applicant is a bonafide doctoral candidate whose advanced work toward the degree is at a significant stage of completion.

CONVENTION RULES

REGISTRATION

- 1) Each collegiate and alumni business delegate shall be registered and cleared by the Credentials Committee.
- 2) For admission to the business delegate section of the Assembly Hall, delegates shall be required to wear the official business delegate badge which is issued by the Credentials Committee at the time of registration.

VOTING BODY

- 1) The voting body shall consist of the members of the Executive Board and the duly accredited business delegates of collegiate and alumni chapters.
- 2) An alternate must be cleared through the Credentials Committee and be raised from Alternate to Delegate.
- Only those delegates who are approved by the Credentials Committee shall be entitled to introduce motions, discuss and vote.
- 4) There shall be no voting by proxy.
- 5) Music delegates and visitors will not be seated with delegates during business sessions. Special seating areas will be provided for them.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1) All motions are to be submitted in writing as resolutions to the Resolutions Committee chairman, no later than noon on Sunday, August 16, 1992. (For proper resolution form see the Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised, pp. 87-89). The resolution must be signed by the delegate presenting it, with the name of the chapter represented.
- 2) All resolutions may only be adopted, rejected, or returned to the Resolutions Committee for amendment.

DISCUSSION

- 1) To ask recognition from the Chair, a delegate must proceed to a microphone and clearly state name and chapter.
- 2) No subject shall be discussed longer than fifteen minutes. Each delegate shall be limited to three minutes of discussion.
- 3) No member may speak a second time until all others who wish to speak have the opportunity to do so.
- 4) No member shall be given the privilege of the floor more than twice on the same question without the unanimous consent of the voting body.

LIMITATION OF TIME

- 1) The International President shall appoint a timekeeper to serve at each business session.
- 2) After giving each speaker a thirty-second warning before the expiration of time allowed, the timekeeper shall call to order the speaker whose time has expired. The speaker, without further comment, shall immediately relinquish the floor.

TELLERS

- 1) One Teller for each Province is appointed by the International President to take attendance at each session, to count and tabulate a rising vote or a vote by secret ballot, to assist at the polls, and to act as Page during the business session.
- 2) During a rising vote, only Tellers will be permitted to move about.

NOMINATIONS

- 1) An Alphabetical Listing of all persons recommended for international office and approved by the Screening Committee shall be distributed to business delegates.
- 2) There shall be NO campaigning by or for any candidate.
- 3) Additional nominations may be made from the floor, but prior approval must be obtained from nominee. Qualifications will then be verified by the Nominating Committee before the names are placed on the ballot.
- 4) After all nominations have been completed, an alphabetical list of all nominees for each office shall be prepared and distributed by the Nominating Committee to all delegates and shall include all pertinent information to assist the delegates in making their final decision. A picture of each nominee shall be posted in a prominent place at the Convention by the Nominating Committee.
